TIME is running out! RESOLUTIONS DUE BY APRIL 28th



Resolutions must be submitted to the Chair of the Resolutions Committee one (l) month prior to the Annual Meeting. The Resolutions Committee shall present all resolutions to the Annual Meeting together with their recommendations. Resolutions signed by at least (10) delegates representing at least (5) states may be received from the floor.

Resolutions should be short and to the point, addressing only one concern, should contain no more than three statements beginning with {"Whereas," and should make only one recommendation in the statement beginning with "Resolved."

The resolve should require action that can be accomplished. There should be only one issue in a resolution. If more than one is needed, a separate resolution should address that issue.



TOUR A: SANTA FE - "THE CITY DIFFERENT"

Historic, Artistic, Authentic - "The City Different" as it is known, will charm you as you visit the historic plaza, meander through unique shops, art galleries, restaurants and world-famous museums. Visit the **Loretto Chapel**, built by a mysterious carpenter believed by some to be St. Joseph. This tour will be six hours and leaves from the hotel at 1:00 pm on Wednesday, May 28, 2008. The tour is \$60.00 and includes a guided walking tour of Santa Fe, admission to the Loretto Chapel and an exclusive wine and cheese reception at the Green Gallery in Tesuque. TOUR B: DISCOVER ACOMA - "SKY CITY"
The people of Acoma Pueblo ("people of the white rock") live atop a 370-foot sandstone mesa.
The 2,000-year-old "Sky City" has the distinction of being the oldest continuously inhabited community in North America. It is known as a cultural and art destination.

Fewer than 50 tribal members live year-round in the earthen homes of Sky City. It is the first Native American community designated by the National Trust of Historic Preservation in Washington, D.C. as a National Historic Trust Site. Those living in the community maintain the massive San Estevan del Rey Mission, which was completed in 1640.

This tour leaves from the hotel at 10:30 AM on Thursday, May 29, 2008. The tour is five hours and the \$50.00 fee includes a box lunch and the walking tour admission fee.

TOUR C: HOT AIR BALLOONING -- ONE OF OUR SPECIALTIES!

If being at the "top of the world" at Sky City is not high enough for you, then try being high above your host city when you take a hot air balloon ride. Rainbow Ryders, the official hot air balloon sponsor of the NFDW Convention, will be offering hot air balloon rides for our convention adventurers. If you want to have a "bird's eye view" of your host city, then sign up! Your balloon pilot will meet you in the hotel lobby at 5:30 AM and you will return at 9:45 AM. Balloon rides will be offered on Wednesday, May 28th and Thursday, May 29th.

News from West Virginia

he members of the West Virginia Federation of Democratic Women, Inc. were saddened by the death of long time member and friend, House of Delegates member Margarette Leach who passed away in December 2007.

The new officers for 2008–2009 have hit the ground running. New State President Belinda Biafore is excited about the upcoming election year. "Democratic women are in it to win it" she said, "we are tired of the current administration and we are going to make a difference in November".

The WVFDW's Annual Democratic Women's Legislative Day at the West Virginia State Capitol in Charleston, WV was a huge success. Over 150 women from across the State participated and met with State lawmakers.

Meetings are being conducted around the State by the Federation's District Directors during the months of March and April. The workshops are focusing on training the President, Secretary, Treasurer and Parliamentarian in each of the West Virginia County clubs.

All eyes may be on West Virginia again, as the Democratic race for the Presidential nomination continues. West Virginia is usually not even thought of during the Primary election because its Primary, which is held in May, is so late in the season. "West Virginia gave John Kennedy the delegates he needed to secure the Presidential nomination at the Democratic National Convention in 1960", said Marge Burke, a former WVFDW State President and former Speaker Pro-tem of the West Virginia House of Delegates. She continued, "I believe West Virginia is going to once again play a pivotal role at the Convention in Denver."

Description: This is an excellent one-of-a-kind pendant and necklace set. The pendant is hand constructed by Navajo artist Johnny Watson using turquoise from the


